Public Comments Regarding 4:00 P.M. Portion of Council Meeting for Study Session and Closed Session Agenda Items

Speaker representing Huntington Beach Tomorrow voiced organization's position on retaining open space. Development only preferred in the footprint of previous buildings. Encouraged Council to keep sites public.

Forty year resident of Huntington Beach spoke in favor of retaining open space in Huntington Beach urged Council to keep sites or condition them so that residents will have space to play soccer and congregate.

Speaker in opposition to development of any sites. Gave examples of the many uses for these sites. Spoke of cyclical nature of government funding and the need for open space to develop healthy children into healthy adults.

Speaker in favor of acquiring the school sites as City property. Spoke regarding Quimby Act Standards and options for funding purchases of sites.

Twenty-nine year resident, founder of Saveourfield.org spoke in support of acquisition of fields. Updated Council on organization's recent activities.

Speaker inquired if the City Council will consider legal action to delay the sale to developers. Gave reasons why more information is needed to determine necessity to develop sites.

Huntington Beach High School teacher, Huntington Beach resident and parent spoke regarding value of open space and fields. Referred to Huntington Beach Sports Complex as geared to adults and need of fields for kids. Urged Council to save greenbelts.

Friends of Harbours, Beaches and Parks member asked Council to consider initiating right of first option to purchase to preserve the space.

Resident with home adjacent to Wardlow Field spoke regarding the many uses of the field. Alleged over 3,000 children use the field. Gave opinion that more housing is not needed.

Speaker on behalf of the coaches at Wardlow Field expressed concerns for impact on Little League and soccer. Expressed appreciation to Council for taking the time to address the issue.

(City Council/Redevelopment Agency) Study Session – Presentation from the Offices of the City Attorney and Finance, and the Departments of Community Services, Economic Development, and Planning Regarding Closed/Surplus Huntington Beach/Fountain Valley School Sites (110.10)

The City of Huntington Beach has been advised by the Fountain Valley and Huntington Beach City School Districts that they are in the process of closing and/or surplus school sites. This raises an issue for the community of the potential loss of open space as well as impacts on neighborhoods because of the possible redevelopment of these sites. For this reason, staff is conducting a study session with Council to provide an overall perspective on closed/surplus school sites citywide. This report includes information provided by the City Attorney, Finance and Economic Development, as well as Community Services and Planning.

Communication titled *Closed/Surplus School Site Issues* and PowerPoint report titled *City Council Study Session – Closed/Surplus School Site Issues* are included in the agenda packet. ***Planning Director Howard Zelefsky gave an introduction to the topic. Community Services Director Jim Engle gave an overview of the school sites affected and the usage of these sites. City Attorney Jennifer McGrath spoke regarding legal issues, including the Naylor Act. Director Zelefsky informed Council of General Plan rezoning and environmental requirements. Finance Officer Dan Villella spoke regarding methods for funding purchase of school sites. Council inquiries ensued regarding timing for method of financing decisions, potential usage of surplus sales funds, clarification of Naylor Act, assessment districts, and funds available in Park Acquisition Fund. Mayor Hardy announced time constraints – discussion of topic to continue at the 6PM meeting.***

Communication from Councilmember Gil Coerper transmitting the following **Statement of Issue:** Last month, the Orange County Vector Control District (OCVCD) called to order their 700th meeting—almost 60 years of serving the people of Orange County. As the county grew and new cities came into existence, each city had an appointed trustee to represent its interests. The Board

of Trustees grew to 35, one trustee for each city and one for the county. These trustees are liaisons to their cities appointed by each City Council for a term of either two or four years.

The DeVore bill would change the Board membership to seven members, two appointed by the county's Board of Supervisors and five by a selection committee.

(120.90)

Communication from Councilmember Keith Bohr transmitting the following **Statement of Issue:** On February 22, 2005, the City Council denied Negative Declaration No. 04-02 and General Plan Amendment No. 04-02. The action related to changing the General Plan designation from commercial back to residential in a number of areas along Beach Boulevard. The 2005 action was a follow-up to Council direction in 2000 when, after public testimony, the Council declined to change the zoning for the area from residential to commercial to bring it into compliance with the General Plan designation. Instead, the Council directed that staff initiate a General Plan Amendment to change the General Plan designation for these areas back to residential. The original change to the General Plan for these areas was approved in 1996 as part of a comprehensive update of the General Plan, which was designed to encourage a mixed-use zone along Beach Boulevard to foster more commercial development.

Significant time had passed since the direction from the City Council in 2000. In the intervening five years, economic needs changed city wide. As a result, the City Council decided not to process the General Plan Amendment and directed staff to work on a development plan for Beach Boulevard.

There are several residential parcels within the affected area which I believe could have a residential General Plan designation and zoning with little impact on future commercial development. I would like to propose that the City Council appoint me and one or two other Council representatives to meet with Planning and Economic Development staff to carve out residential uses in these areas that would not be appropriate for commercial development. This way, those parcels not needed for commercial development could be upgraded at the owner's discretion. At the same time, it would allow us to continue with the Beach Boulevard development plan without holding up residents for a plan that would most likely never result in conversion of their property to a commercial use.

Should the City Council be willing to consider this request, I would like to return to the City Council with the appropriate documents to remove the unneeded parcels from the Beach Boulevard plan and initiate a General Plan Amendment and environmental review for the carved out parcels, as appropriate.

Recommended Action: Motion to:

Recommend that the City Council designate ~~me and one or two other Council Members~~ Councilmembers Bohr, Sullivan and Cook to meet with staff to tour residential parcels located adjacent to and/or just off of Beach Boulevard for potential conversion from commercial back to residential use. Review of parcels should be limited to those identified in the February 22, 2005, staff report, which are not needed for commercial development. It is further recommended that the staff be directed to return with a recommendation for the land use designations for the properties.
