OCTOBER DONATIONS UPDATE

The Huntington Beach Neighborhood Watch Program (HBNW) fiscal year is from July 1 to June 30 each year. We have estimated we will need approximately \$24,300 this year to cover the various HBNW program expenses which include, but are not limited to, newsletter assembly, distribution costs, returned postage, mailing labels, etc. From the start of our fiscal year to now, we have received \$6,815.00 in donations and newsletter advertisements- we have \$17,485.00 to go by June 30, 2018. The HBNW Board thanks you and our advertisers for your support and generous donations. An \$8 donation pays for each subscriber's distribution costs; a \$10 donation helps with these costs and other needed expenses and puts your name in the Newsletter as a contributor; and a \$25 or more donation accomplishes the above, plus you will receive a HBNW sticker and a token of appreciation. Remember, HBNW is a non-profit organization; donations are tax deductible.

As a resident of the city, we encourage you to review the HBNW program budget and expenses.

IME PREVENTION PREPARED?

With the holidays upon us, most people are in a happy and generous mood. Criminals know this and will try to take advantage by targeting your home and your good will.

You can do a lot to help deter this type of behavior; remember, most criminals are looking for that easy target. By hardening the target, staying alert and aware, and reporting all suspicious activity to your local police, you can help keep your family, friends, and yourself safe.

Below are some crime prevention and safety tips you should try to follow year round and especially during the holidays:

When stepping out for the evening:

- Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it will appear that someone is home. Use timers.
- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes.
- Keep curtains or shutters closed if you have gifts under your tree or in a place that can be seen from outside. (continued on page 3)

Neighborhood Watch Newsletter Survey

The Huntington Beach Police Department and the HB Neighborhood Watch Program are always looking for ways to improve on the information provided to those who work and live in this great city. Technology and the way the police department tracks criminal activity is one of those areas which is continually evolving.

The Police Department has a desire to move the Neighborhood Watch Newsletter to a more interactive, electronic online format. This will improve on the accuracy of the information provided to the citizens and provide direct access to crime trends in your neighborhood.

For the past 45 years, the newsletter has served the community as the main source of information by either US Mail or local pick up locations. The total cost of this newsletter is approximately \$31,000 annually between printing and postage. We currently print 9,000 copies and mail approximately 7,500 newsletters to households throughout HB. Your HB Neighborhood Watch Program has always paid the postage and other expenses with the money collected from your most generous donations. - Always use motion sensors or dusk to dawn lighting outside, even when you're home.
- Secure your garage door with a cane bolt, pad, or hasp lock.

If you are shopping:

- Park in a well-lighted space, and be sure to close and lock all doors and windows. Place shopping bags, gifts, etc, in the trunk, out of sight.
- Stay alert and aware of everything around you.
- Do not carry large amounts of cash, and only carry the credit cards you plan to use. Pay with check or credit card when possible and be sure to keep all receipts. Remember to protect your personal information (check and credit card numbers).
- When shopping with children, teach them where to go if you should become separated or need assistance. They could find a store employee or cashier. Never have them go back to your vehicle alone.
- Don't overburden yourself with packages; be extra careful with purses and wallets. Purses should be carried close to our body, not dangling by a thin strap. Men, place your wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.

Protecting your Vehicle:

- If you leave packages in your car, move your vehicle to a new location (thieves may be watching).
- Close all windows, lock your vehicle, and use anti-theft devices.
- Never leave your car's engine running while you run into your home or a store, even for a minute.
- When you stop to purchase gas, turn your engine off, remove your keys, and lock your doors. Pay attention to your surroundings while pumping gas.
- Never leave a child unattended in a vehicle

These are just a few safety tips that may help you stay safe over the holidays and throughout the year. Show you care and share this information with family and friends. Consider hosting a Neighborhood Watch Block meeting!

We're Looking for Dedicated, Kind, Supportive, and Creative People who want to make HB a Safer Place to Live

The goal of the Neighborhood Watch Program is to help educate the community about crime prevention activities everyone can be involved in. Your Neighborhood Watch Board members are the roots of the Neighborhood Watch Program; you, its members, are the branches.

Board members help to teach the importance of knowing your neighbors, how to report suspicious activity, and keeping you and your family safe. The Neighborhood Watch Board may consist of up to 12 members. The Executive Board is made up of the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretary; the other members are all referred to as members at large.

To become a board member, you must attend at least 3 Neighborhood Watch Board meetings, be willing to have your fingerprints taken, and to have a local background and driver's license check. If you are selected, we would like at least a one year commitment.

The Board meets once monthly, usually the 2nd Tuesday of the month; but on occasion we may move it to another day. We meet at either at Rodgers Community Center or at the Police Department. The Board does not meet in July, August, and December; however, there may still be community events planned.

In order to have HB Neighborhood Watch Newsletter crime statistics match what is reported by the HBPD crime analysis team to the Department of Justice, our crime statistic page formats have changed. Although it may look a little different, residential burglaries will still be reported as well as a small narrative of how the crimes may have occurred. Vehicle burglaries are in another chart broken down by Beat and RD, and Grand Theft Auto can be found in the large chart broken down by Beat. You will also find other crime statistics on the chart, such as rape, robbery, thefts from vehicles, etc. To locate your Beat and RD, please check the map on page 7.

You Need a Personal Safety Plan for Black Friday

Arlington, VA -The National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC), home of McGruff the Crime Dog, says you need a personal safety and security plan to keep criminals at bay and you from seeing red. This year many shoppers will be out early to find those big bargains on Black Friday or online for Cyber Monday, but the criminals will be out too. NCPC has 10 great tips to help you shop safely while getting those great holiday bargains throughout the shopping season.

- 1. Do not buy more than you can carry. Plan ahead by taking a friend with you or ask a store employee to help you carry your packages to the car.
- 2. Shop online with companies you know and trust. Check a company's background if you are not familiar with it. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it usually is.
- 3. Save all receipts. Print and save all confirmations from your online purchases. Start a file folder to keep all receipts together and to help you verify credit card or bank statements as they come in.
- 4. Consider alternate options to pay for your merchandise, such as onetime or multiuse disposable credit cards or money orders, at online stores and auction sites.
- 5. Wait until asked before taking out your credit card or checkbook. An enterprising thief would love to shoulder surf to get your account information.
- 6. Deter pickpockets. Carry your purse close to your body or your wallet inside a coat or front trouser pocket.
- 7. Have your keys in hand when approaching your vehicle. Check the back seat and around the car before getting in.
- 8. Do not leave packages visible in your car windows. Lock them in the trunk or, if possible, take them directly home.
- 9. Tell a security guard or store employee if you see an unattended bag or package. The same applies if you are using mass transit.
- 10. If you are shopping with children, make a plan in case you get separated. Select a central meeting place and make sure they know they can ask mall personnel or store security employees if they need help.




