


## CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

#### 26TH ANNUAL SURF CITY MARATHON THIS WEEKEND - FEB. 6

The 26th Annual Surf City Marathon and Half-Marathon takes place this Sunday, February 6, along the scenic Pacific Coast Highway, finishing just steps away from the beach. This year, more than 11,000 runners are set to run along the breathtaking coast of Huntington Beach, with approximately 2,000 volunteers cheering them on. At the finish line, signature surfboard medals and a music festival welcome the long-distance runners.

Marathon activities begin on Friday, February 4, and Saturday, February 5 with an Active Lifestyle Expo that is free to the public and features health and fitness vendors offering samples and products for purchase. Saturday, February 5, the day before the marathon, you can warm up with a beach mile race along the sand beginning at 11 a.m. The marathon, half-marathon, and 5k run will take place on Sunday, beginning at 6:30 a.m. The Surf City Marathon event weekend concludes in celebration with a finish line music festival and beer garden, included for all runners.

#### Watch for detours and road closures

For those not participating in the activities this weekend, plan accordingly for road closures, detours, and traffic along Pacific Coast Highway. Closures will begin on PCH as early as 1 a.m. and going until 2 p.m. The Huntington Beach Police Department will begin towing parked vehicles along these impacted streets at 12 a.m. on Sunday, February 6.


The following closures will take place on Sunday, February 6, during the marathon:

- Garfield St. (from Seapoint to Edwards) 4 a.m. 10:30 a.m.
- Edwards St. (from Garfield to Central Park Dr.) 4 a.m. 10 a.m.
- Goldenwest St. (from Ellis to Slater) 4 a.m. 10 a.m.
- Central Park Dr. (from Edwards to Central Park Dr.) 4 a.m. 10 a.m.

#### CITY FORMS COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER CANNABIS



Like many cities in California, Huntington Beach may consider a cannabis program to permit a limited number of retail stores and other cannabis industries to operate in the City. The City formed an ad-hoc committee that includes Council Members Rhonda Bolton, Dan Kalmick, and Erik Peterson to discuss and recommend program details to the City Council for further consideration at a future meeting.

In 2016, California voters approved Prop 64 (Adult Use of Marijuana Act) legalizing recreational adult (21+) cannabis use and allows certain cannabis industries to operate, provided they secure both state and local permits to do so. While cities like Santa Ana, Costa Mesa, and Stanton allow some form of cannabis operations in their jurisdiction, Huntington Beach currently does not.

The ad-hoc committee held its first meeting on January 24, 2022 and considered various cannabis industries from retail to manufacturing, buffer zones from sensitive uses like schools, taxation rates for cannabis businesses, and the number of permits that would be issued.

#### **NEW STATE LAW REQUIRES FOOD RECYLCING**



We are already recycling plastic, glass, paper and yard clippings, and we will soon add food to the list.

State law, SB 1383 went into effect January 1, 2022, and is designed to reduce methane emissions that can occur when food waste ends up in landfills.

Under this new law, food scraps will be recycled and used for compost. The City is working with its refuse provider, Republic Services, to develop an organics recycling program to begin later this year. In the coming months, the City will provide information to residents, businesses, and restaurants on how to collect their food waste and deposit it in a green waste container instead of their trash.

The new law also sets a statewide goal of recovering 20 percent of excess edible food from restaurants, hospitals, hotels and supermarkets to be sent to food banks. CalRecycle estimates that Californians send 11.2 billion pounds of food to landfills each year and some of that food can go to help the nearly-one-in-four Californians who don't know where their next meal is coming from. Huntington Beach will expand our existing edible food recovery program to help meet the statewide target.

The City anticipates having an organics recycling program fully implemented by the second half of 2022. The City will provide more information in the weeks and months ahead.

### CITY'S DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE TEAM OFFERS HELP TO BUSINESSES



The City's Development Assistance Team (DAT) works to help businesses looking to build or set up shop in Surf City USA. The most challenging part of launching a business or developing a project could be making sure you are in compliance with city regulatory, permitting, and zoning requirements.

The DAT is an internal committee made up of experts in Planning, Building, Public Works, Transportation, Water, Fire, and Community Services. They contribute during the early stages of a proposed project to provide feedback and guide the project through approvals.

This project will build an elevated path that will be four feet wide, 300 feet in length, and include handrails on both sides. The path will provide access to Dog Park, the Urban Forest and the new playground at Central Park.

#### FEBRUARY IS AMERICAN HEART MONTH - CONT'D

#### Signs and Symptoms of Stroke

IF YOU HAVE ANY OF THESE SIGNS, CALL 9-1-1 AND GET TO A HOSPITAL RIGHT AWAY.

- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body
- 2. Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding
- 3. Sudden trouble seeing or blurred vision in one or both eyes
- 4. Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination
- 5. Sudden severe headache with no known cause

#### Signs and Symptoms of Heart Attack

IF YOU HAVE ANY OF THESE SIGNS, CALL 9-1-1 AND GET TO A HOSPITAL RIGHT AWAY.

- Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than a few minutes or goes away and comes back.
- Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort.

But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.

#### CREATE A FIRE ESCAPE PLAN



Every second counts in a residential fire. Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as two minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Don't have an escape plan? The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has helpful tools to help create your own Fire Escape Plan. Creating and practicing an escape plan may seem unnecessary, but these actions can have heroic results.

Please help with our community risk reduction and remember that kitchen safety is important to prevent fires in your home. Here are some safety tips:

- Don't leave your cooking appliances unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, boiling, or broiling food.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.
- Be alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, do not use the stove or stovetop.

### RODGERS SENIORS' CENTER MEMORIAL AND PUBLIC PARK GROUNDBREAKING



On Friday, February 11, at 10 a.m., the City will remember the positive impacts that the Rodgers Seniors' Center has had on our senior community and celebrate the groundbreaking of the City's newest public park.

The Center served as an army barracks for the Santa Ana Air Force Base in 1948-1949, and was dedicated as the City's recreation center in 1949. It was later repurposed in 1975 as a senior recreation center. The Center was rededicated on April 27, 1984 and named for Michael E. Rodgers for his outstanding humanitarian efforts for the older adult community and a founder of the Huntington Beach Council on Aging (HBCOA).

On July 20, 2020, the City Council approved a plan to redevelop the site. A contract for construction was awarded on December 21, 2021 for the City to redevelop the Center into a new public park. The new park will include open green space, walking paths, a renovated clubhouse for community use, and added picnic and seating areas. Construction will begin this month, with an estimated completion of March 2023.

#### **CENTRAL LIBRARY NEWS**




