TWELVE YEAR OLD BOY CATCHES TEN LB. HALIBUT.

The biggest fish reported as having been caught from the new pier was the halibut caught Thursday afternoon by Harold MacGregor, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McIlreath, of 274 Eleventh street.

Harold was fishing on the outer toe of the pier when the big halibut came along and helped himself to the bait on his hook. He was not using a 20- or 27 foot either, as the line he cast was one that he carried around in his pocket in the good old fashioned way. When the fish began pulling on the line Harold thought he had connected up with a whale, but he did not get excited, and he was assisted in landing his catch by Ed Walker, who happened to be there at the time. Harold presented the fish as evidence at the News office, where the tape line showed it to be 31 1/2 inches long and 22 inches around, weighing 10 pounds.

JUDGE CRAIG IS A PRACTICAL LAW INSTRUCTOR.

That Judge Gavin W. Craig, candidate for presiding justice of the district court of appeal, in this district, is a practical law instructor, is evidenced by the fact that he takes his "water rights" and irrigation law classes in the University of Southern California, where he has been a teacher for the past ten years, out through the country and over water-bearing lands; the first trip being in the Verdugo canyon near Glendale, and over the artesian belt near San Fernando. BEGAN BUSINESS WITH A CAPITAL OF \$3.75

There is one man in business in Huntington Beach whose record reads like one of the stories of the Arabian Nights—the only difference being that the local story is a true one and the Arabian may not have been.

April 1, 1909, John H. Mr. Eader states that at that time his cash assets were just \$3.75, and he induced the First National Bank of this city to loan him one half of the purchase price and gave notes to Mr. Larson for the balance.

He assumed charge December 22, 1910, and went to work with the ambition of making the best bread on the market for the money, and he never deviated from that policy from that day to this, and says he never expects to do so, as he well realizes that has been the key note of his success. Then the shop was baking about 200 loaves of bread and today more than 900 are sold daily.

In November, 1911, a horse and wagon was purchased to care for the growing business; and in October, 1912, the horse was found to be too slow and a big Reo delivery car was put on the route. And each week Eader's bread is delivered over a 20-mile route, including stores in Wintersburg, Westminster, Stanton, Garden Grove, Bolsa and Talbert.

Some of these points are considerably nearer Santa Ana than they are to Huntington Beach, which shows very plainly that it's the Eader quality that pulls the business. Mr. Eader is a young man, having been born over in Old Tennessee, Washington's Birthday, 1887, and was married October 21, 1911.
