The Huntington Beach Neighborhood Watch Program (HBNW) **fiscal year** is from July 1 to June 30 each year. We have estimated we will need approximately \$24,300 this year to cover the various HBNW program expenses which include, but are not limited to, newsletter assembly, distribution costs, returned postage, mailing labels, etc. From the start of our fiscal year to now, we have received **\$6,909.99 in donations and newsletter advertisements— we have \$17,390.01 to go by June 30, 2014.** The HBNW Board thanks you and our advertisers for your support and generous donations. **HBPD WOULD LIKE
YOU TO KNOW.....**

**If you walk your dog in a City park,
it needs to be on a leash.**

The Huntington Beach Police Department and Orange County Animal Care want to remind residents that they must keep their dogs on a leash when in public areas.

- HBMC 13.48.070 Animals, HBMC 7.04.010 Adoption of County Ordinances and Orange County Codified Ordinance (OCCO) 4-1-45 Restraint of Dogs states in part: “No person owning or having charge, care, custody, or control of any dog shall cause or permit, either willfully or through failure to exercise due care or control, any such dog to be upon any public property unless such dog be restrained by a substantial chain, or leash not exceeding six (6) feet in length, and is under the charge of a person competent to exercise care, custody, and control over such dog.”

This means - Your dog must be leashed anytime your dog is off your property. Your dog must be on a leash no longer than six (6) feet in length and in the care of a competent person.

The absence of a leash is lawfully allowed only in designated “dog parks.”

- Animals allowed to roam off leash may create a public nuisance by destroying property and causing injuries to themselves and others, all of which may result in a civil action/lawsuit against the owner.

School Driving Safety Tips



Here are some safety tips to remember now that children are back in school:

1. *Don't text while driving.* Don't talk on your phone or send text messages while you're driving. Apart from the safety concerns, it's important to [practice what you preach](#) -- don't text and drive.
2. *Watch out for hot spots.* Keep an eye out for those child "hot spots" like marked school zones, as well as areas near bus stops and bike lanes.
3. *Yield to school buses.* Don't try to overtake the bus (like one impatient driver in Ohio who was [sentenced by a court to wear an "Idiot" sign around her neck](#)) -- it's a moving violation (and rude, too). If a bus has a flashing, alternating red light, you are legally required to stop and wait for the light to turn off.
4. *Expect the unexpected.* Children can dart out unexpectedly. Follow the speed limit, yield to crossing guards and be vigilant.
5. *Budget extra travel time.* School areas are congested, so allow for more time to get where you're going. The extra time will help you avoid bouts of road rage and avoid accidents.

Pedestrian and Bicycle Rider's Safety Laws Review

The Huntington Beach Police Department receives complaints every year regarding traffic violations near our schools. These complaints include vehicles speeding, double parking, blocking/impeding traffic, failing to yield to oncoming traffic, making illegal U-turns, not signaling, and driving past school buses with flashing red lights, just to name a few.

In the past 12 months, our officers have issued about five hundred citations to juveniles for bicycle and pedestrian violations. The most common violations include riding on the wrong side of the road, not wearing a helmet, riding double, riding outside the bike lane, riding motorized scooters, walking against don't walk signs, jaywalking, etc... Although citations are unpleasant for everyone, they are necessary to ensure bicycle and pedestrian safety in our city.

In the past year, the Huntington Beach Police Department has responded to 76 traffic collisions involving pedestrians resulting in 76 injuries and two fatalities. We also responded to 135 collisions involving bicycles resulting in 130 injuries. Our goal is to have no injuries or fatalities occur, but that is not possible without your help.

We have attached a short list of some of the most common violations related to bicycle, pedestrian, and vehicle operations. This is simply a reminder of some of the state and local laws we enforce daily for your safety and your children's safety. We encourage you to discuss these laws with your children and remind them of their responsibilities as pedestrians and bicycle riders. We also hope this will serve as a friendly reminder to you as a driver while you drop off and pick up your children at our schools.

The Huntington Beach Police Department is both committed to and concerned with your child's safety. Let's all do our part to make this school year the safest year yet for our children.

21200 CVC (Bicycle rider responsibilities) Every person riding a bicycle upon a highway has all the rights and is subject to all the provisions applicable to the driver of a vehicle by this division.

21212 CVC (Bicycle Helmets) A person under 18 years of age shall not operate (nor ride upon as a passenger) a bicycle, a non-motorized scooter, skateboard, or wear in-line or roller skates, unless that person is wearing a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet.

21456 CVC (Walk against signal) Cross against "DONT WALK", "WAIT", or "Upraised Hand" symbol prohibited.

21955 CVC (Jaywalking) Between adjacent intersections controlled by traffic control signal devices, pedestrians shall not cross the roadway at any place except in a crosswalk.

22352 CVC (School zone) Maximum speed in a school zone is 25 (twenty-five) miles per hour, when children are present.

22454 CVC (School bus loading passengers) Do not pass school bus until flashing red lights and/or stop signal arm cease.



Red Ribbon Week October 23-31, 2013







By participating in Take-Back-Days, you are helping the DEA and its state, local, tribal law-enforcement, and community partners to remove medications from circulation. The event will be held at:


