FEBRUARY DONATION UPDATE

The Huntington Beach Neighborhood Watch Program (HBNW) **fiscal year** is from July 1 to June 30 each year. We have estimated we will need approximately \$25,000 this year to cover the various HBNW program expenses which include, but are not limited to, newsletter assembly, distribution costs, returned postage, mailing labels, etc. From the start of our fiscal year to now, we have received **\$11,193.33 in donations and newsletter advertisements-- we have \$13,806.67 to go** by June 30, 2011. The HBNW Board thanks you and our advertisers for your support and generous donations. A \$6 donation pays for each subscriber's distribution costs; a \$10 donation helps with these costs and other needed expenses and puts your name in the Newsletter as a contributor; and a \$25 or more donation accomplishes the above, plus you will receive a HBNW sticker and a token of appreciation. The Huntington Beach Police Department's RSVP (**Retired Senior Volunteer Program**) is comprised of men and women 55 years or older who come from all walks of life. Many of our RSVP's have joined the program because they want to give back to the community by sharing their time, talents, wisdom, and knowledge with the Huntington Beach Police Department.

Some of the duties performed by our RSVP's include but are not limited to:

- Vacation House Checks
- Remove illegally posted signs
- Staff Substations
- Assist in the Detective Bureau
- Assist at the HBPD Front Counter
- Curb Crime
- "Extra eyes and ears" for the Department
- 4th of July parade
- and many other miscellaneous activities

Prospective applicants are selected after passing an oral interview, a background check, and a positive

assessment of their suitability for the various duties performed with the Police Department. If selected you must then attend the 25 hour RSVP Academy. Participants must live in Huntington Beach, have a valid driver's license, be in good physical health, and be able to volunteer a minimum of twenty-four hours a month. ***Residential Burglaries
in Beats 4 and 7***

In January 2011, there was an increase in residential burglaries in Beat 4 and Beat 7. Beat 4 reported five burglaries in January 2010 and 10 burglaries in January 2011. In Beat 7, five burglaries were reported in January 2010, and seven burglaries in January 2011. Some of the burglaries involved unsecure residences and others involved forced entry through a rear sliding door. Another trend was that in several of the burglaries, residents were not home for more than one day when the crimes occurred.

The Neighborhood Watch program emphasizes the importance of knowing your neighbors and having friends know when you are home and when you are not. If you see someone suspicious around a neighbor's house, and they are not home, call 911.

The Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) offers free vacation house checks to residents of Huntington Beach. Vacation house checks can be set up on the police department's webpage www.hbpd.org; look under "eServices", or by calling 714-374-1507.

FireMed- What You Need to Know



In a medical emergency, the Huntington Beach Fire Department responds quickly to provide the most advanced emergency medical services – ensuring the best possible patient care. Positive impacts are made in lives every day due to the success of FireMed, the official voluntary membership program. Since 1990, FireMed has enhanced the ability to answer the community's call for help by providing the funding that doesn't come from taxes – such as additional paramedics, advanced training, emergency transportation vehicles and lifesaving medical equipment and medication.

An option available to Huntington Beach residents is to join the FireMed Membership Program. Even though the Huntington Beach Fire Department charges for emergency medical treatment and transportation, FireMed will protect your out-of-pocket costs by accepting your insurance or Medicare payment as 'payment in full' – even if there is a co-payment, deductible or denial.

FireMed membership is just \$60 per year per household (a low-income membership of \$30 is available with qualification). Quite often, this membership fee is less than the co-pay or deductible that you might pay, and takes away the worries you might have about whether your insurance will even pay the pre-hospital bill.

What else do you receive as a FireMed member? Your membership protects everyone who lives in your household, and the medical emergency can occur anywhere in Huntington Beach. That out-of-pocket protection is extended to your guest who has an emergency medical incident at your FireMed residence. You also receive a Medical Information Program packet, which is a vital information resource used by paramedics in an emergency. Ever take a CPR class, or maybe you need to recertify? As a FireMed member, everyone in your household can attend FREE American Heart Association CPR classes!

With these fees for service in place, what happens when you call 9-1-1 for a medical emergency? Of course, the fire department will respond as quickly as possible whenever you place a call for help. (Funding from the FireMed Program helps facilitate this quick response.) Upon arrival, the paramedics will assess and treat the patient (using medications and lifesaving equipment funded by FireMed), and then transport the patient to the hospital (the emergency transport units are funded by FireMed). During this incident, no one will ask for proof that you are a FireMed member - after all, the medical emergency and helping the patient is much more important!

After the medical emergency, membership status is checked in the FireMed office and the service and treatment fees are calculated, generating a bill for you. What should you do when you receive your bill?

- ***Keep your fingers crossed and hope that your health insurance will cover the entire bill.*** An average paramedic and emergency ambulance bill is \$1,000 or more. Does your health insurance guarantee that they will cover the total bill, regardless of your emergency situation and just because you dialed 9-1-1? The answer is 'no' – an insurance company will never make that guarantee. They review every single claim before agreeing to provide payment.
- ***Pay the deductible, co-payment and denial amount.*** If your insurance pays only a portion of the bill and you have a deductible, co-payment or denial, you will be responsible for the unpaid balance. Depending on your insurance plan, this could be costly.
- ***Breathe a sigh of relief because you are a FireMed Member!*** By being a member of the FireMed Program, your entire household is protected from any out-of-pocket costs after your health insurance is billed. It doesn't matter what amount your insurance pays – you won't have to pay the deductible, co-payment or denied amount. (If you don't have insurance, you'll still receive a 20% discount.) You must be a FireMed member prior to the emergency incident for it to be covered.

By being a FireMed member, you save money and ensure that the highest quality of emergency medical care is available in the community when you need help. If you live in Beat 3 and RD 455, you will have 3-455 on your address label.



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
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
