**SEPTEMBER DONATION UPDATE**

The Huntington Beach Neighborhood Watch Program (HBNW) **fiscal year** is from July 1 to June 30 each year. We have estimated we will need approximately \$25,000 this year to cover the various HBNW program expenses which include, but are not limited to, newsletter assembly, distribution costs, returned postage, mailing labels, etc. From the start of our fiscal year to now, we have received **\$3,671 in donations and newsletter advertisements-- we have \$21,329 to go** by June 30 2010. SAFETY TIPS**

- 1. Trick or Treat in your neighborhood**

- 3. Set a time limit for children to Trick or Treat.**
- 4. Remind children not to enter anyone's house or car without asking your permission.**
- 5. Wear white or reflective clothing, carry a flashlight or glow stick, and do not wear masks that obstruct your vision (paint your face instead).**
- 6. Remind children not to eat any of their candy, etc. until you have checked it.**
- 7. Remind children to only cross the street at a corner. Look both ways and/or walk with an adult.**



## Red Ribbon Week History

**Red Ribbon Week** began after the kidnapping, torture and brutal murder of Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena in 1985. Agent Camarena had been working undercover in Guadalajara, Mexico for over four years. His efforts led to a tip that resulted in the discovery of a multimillion dollar narcotics manufacturing operation in Chihuahua, Mexico. The successful eradication of this and other drug production operations angered leaders of several drug cartels who sought revenge. As a result, they murdered key informants and then, on February 7, 1985, they kidnapped Agent Camarena and his pilot Captain Alfredo Zavala-Avelar (taken separately on the same day).

After DEA Agent Camarena and Captain Zavala-Avelar were kidnapped, the DEA launched a massive investigation. The agents found local law enforcement uncooperative at best. DEA Administrator Jack Lawn and US Attorney General Edwin Meese sought greater support from Mexican officials including the Mexican Attorney General but to no avail. Orders from US Customs Commissioner William von Raab effectively closed the US/Mexico border for days putting pressure on the Mexican government to assist.

Soon, representatives of the Mexican Federal Judicial Police (MFJP) presented a tip to DEA Agents claiming that Agent Camarena had been mistakenly kidnapped by a man and his three sons. The MFJP informed the agents that a raid of the man's ranch in Angostura would take place the following morning and invited them to come. However, the MFJP raided the ranch

before DEA agents arrived. During the raid, they shot and killed five individuals. Not long after, a passerby discovered the bodies of both Agent Camarena and Captain Zavala-Avelar by the side of the road not far from the ranch.

The DEA's investigation revealed that Agent Camarena had been tortured extensively before he was murdered. Audiotapes of the torture showed that medical doctors actually kept Agent Camarena alive in order to continue the interrogation. Evidence collected revealed that both Agent Camarena and Captain Zavala-Avelar were initially buried in one location and then moved to the ranch where they were found.

The dramatic events that followed Agent Camarena's disappearance were chronicled in national media here at home. They exposed the dark world of drug trafficking including how far drug traffickers would go to maintain power and control.

In Agent Camarena's home town, Calexico, CA, the public outpouring of support turned in to an organized community response in which citizens wore red ribbons. They became a voice for prevention in order to reduce the demand for illegal drugs and illegal use of legal drugs in America. The following year the California State PTA adopted the **Red Ribbon Week** campaign. Then, in 1988, **Red Ribbon Week** was recognized nationally with President Ronald and First Lady Nancy Reagan serving as the first Honorary Chairs.

Today, the **Red Ribbon Week** brings millions of people together to raise awareness regarding the need for alcohol, tobacco and other drug and violence prevention, early intervention, and treatment services. It is the largest, most visible prevention awareness campaign observed annually in the United States.

Red Ribbon Week serves as a vehicle for communities and individuals to take a stand for the hopes and dreams of our children. Parents join with your children and take the Red Ribbon Pledge:

***"NO USE OF ILLEGAL DRUGS,  
NO ILLEGAL USE OF LEGAL DRUGS."***



## **On-Line Crime Reporting**

The Huntington Beach Police Department has implemented an online system that victims can utilize to report certain crimes over the Internet. For a victim to access the reporting system, they can use the Internet and go to [www.hbpd.org](http://www.hbpd.org) and then click on the eServices link. The victim can then click on the link for online crime reporting and start the process.

The system is set up to handle the following types of calls:

- Petty and Grand Thefts (not fraud related)
- Vandalism
- Lost Property
- Hit and Runs
- Vehicle Burglaries
- Harassing Phone Calls

Victims **should not** use the online crime reporting system under the following conditions:

- There is a known suspect or any suspect info/description
- There is a reasonable likelihood that viable evidence may be collected
- The crime is an ongoing problem
- The incident did not occur within the jurisdiction of the Huntington Beach Police Department
- The victim specifically requests an officer to respond
- The victim requests the desk officer to take the report

When a victim calls the front desk or dispatch and their report meets the listed criteria, the desk officer or complaint writer may refer the victim to the online reporting system. If the victim requests an officer to respond, an officer will be dispatched to take the report. A kiosk is being installed at the front desk to enable victims to go online and file their report if they do not want to wait for the desk officer to take their report.

All reports taken via the online system stay in the computer with unique DR numbers. The Records Bureau does not keep a hard copy of the report on file as with normal reports. Any

supplemental reports by officers will be scanned and added as attachments to the original online report. The report is then forwarded to detectives for any follow up investigation.



## **Huntington Beach Police Volunteer Recognized**

The California Crime Prevention Officers Association selected Richard "Dick" Swanson, of our Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), as their Volunteer of the Year for 2009. Dick Swanson was recognized at the annual conference held on September 16, 2009, in Long Beach.

Dick Swanson joined the RSVP program in 2001. His primary duties include, but are not limited to, conducting house vacation checks, issuing parking citations, and removing illegally posted signs including real estate signs left up past the allotted time. The illegal nuisance signs are discarded as trash. For the signs with value, Dick Swanson created a method to store the real estate signs so that undo costs are not incurred by real estate agents. He compiles a monthly report to the police department and forwards a copy to the Orange County Association of Realtors to facilitate getting the signs returned.

In addition, our community reaped another benefit from Dick's over-the-top efforts. He has been able to return a few lost dogs to their owners by matching the "lost dog" posters in one part of the city with the "found dog" posters in another part. Dick acts as go between by calling the number on the missing dog poster, explaining who he is and giving them the number from the found dog poster. Another example of how Dick has helped so many people.

Removal of signs may seem like a small problem. But a neighborhood littered with illegally posted signs creates an image of a run-down neighborhood. Neighborhoods that appear run-down draw more crime. The work done by Dick Swanson and all the other RSVPs makes a big difference and is what helps to make Huntington Beach a great place to live.


