USING ILLEGAL FIREWORKS? YOU WILL BE CAUGHT AND IT WILL NOW COST YOU MORE!

Huntington Beach is once again preparing for its 4th of July celebration which will start early with a parade and end with a dazzling fireworks display. Fireworks are enjoyable and exciting to watch, but each year illegal fireworks injure thousands of people, many of them children, and cause thousands of fires.

The Huntington Beach Fire and Police Departments want to ensure the safety of all its residents during the 4th of July holiday. They remind you that it is illegal to manufacture, possess, store, sell, and use fireworks in the City of Huntington Beach. This includes so-called "safe and sane" fireworks and those purchased outside of the city or on the internet. This year, the civil citation fines have been increased. By enforcing this code strictly, the Huntington Beach Police and Fire Departments will be hard at work on the 4th of July to keep our city safe.

Officers will increase their patrols several days before and during the holiday to ensure that those who continue to put the safety of their family and community in danger will be caught.

"There are no safe fireworks," stated Huntington Beach Fire Chief, Duane Olson. "Fireworks are dangerous and illegal in the City of Huntington Beach. If you are caught using or possessing fireworks of any kind, **you will be fined \$500 for the first offense and \$1,000 for each additional offense.** It is not worth the risk and the safety of your family and friends."



In 2005, fireworks were the cause of 4 fatalities; 10,800 injuries; 7,000 fires; and \$40 million in property loss. An estimated 9,600 emergency room-treated injuries are associated with fireworks annually. Nearly 7,000 of those injuries occur around July 4th. According to the California Hospital Association, "safe and sane" fireworks account for about 30% of these injuries.

Fireworks are especially dangerous to children—even those that are considered relatively safe, like sparklers. Sparklers can burn at temperatures of 2,000 degrees—hot enough to melt some metals—resulting in the majority of injuries to children under the age of 5.

A new study by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission found that more than 50% of fireworks-related injuries occur to children and teenagers under



the age of 14. Children between the ages of five and nine have the highest injury rate. A trip to the emergency room for your child's fireworks injuries can cost an average of \$20,000, while injuries and burns requiring hospitalization can run into six figures.

Given the high number of children injured by fireworks, it is not surprising that the most common ignition factor for fires related to fireworks is children playing with them. These fires cause approximately \$15 million in property loss, injure 50, and kill 15 people, including firefighters, annually according to the U.S. Fire Administration and National Fire Protection Association.

Based on the amount of time and quantities in use, fireworks pose a higher risk of fire death than any other consumer product. On the 4th of July alone, fireworks caused more reported outdoor fires in the US than all other causes combined.

"If you want to celebrate the 4th of July with a fireworks display, the best way to do that is by attending the public fireworks display conducted by professional pyrotechnicians," said Huntington Beach Police Chief, Ken Small. "The police and fire departments are making an extra effort this year to enforce illegal firework violations due to the danger posed by illegal fireworks and the thousands of complaints we receive every year." If your past holiday tradition has been to set off illegal fireworks, it is time to start a new one. The Fourth of July celebration at the Huntington Beach Pier is an annual tradition in the community that will be celebrating its 103rd year in 2007. In previous years, this event has drawn up to 150,000 spectators.



The Huntington Beach Fourth of July celebration features the largest Independence Day parade west of the Mississippi River. This year's parade will include more than 300 entries including bands, floats, film and television celebrities, local dignitaries, equestrians and community groups. After the sun sets, thousands of fireworks synchronized to music will be launched from the Huntington Beach Pier. The safe and exciting professional display will amaze visitors of all ages. As always, this is a free event.



Huntington Beach Police Department Receives Grant To **Combat Drunk Driving**

Huntington Beach residents can look forward to safer streets under a program announced by the Huntington Beach Police Department. A series of special efforts will be undertaken aimed at enforcing DUI traffic laws and educating the public on drunk driving issues.

Two additional motorcycles, a DUI Enforcement Team and stepped-up impaired driving enforcement will be the result of a \$664,128 grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Through this two year grant, the police department will conduct DUI checkpoints, saturation patrols and warrant service operations that will target multiple offenders who violate probation terms or fail to appear in court.

“The grant will improve traffic safety in Huntington Beach,” said Huntington Beach Police Chief, Kenneth W. Small. “Through this grant, funding was obtained to impact those who drive while impaired.” The main goal of the grant is to reduce the number of persons killed or injured in alcohol-related collisions.



BEWARE OF WORK-AT-HOME AND OTHER SCHEMES

Consumers should be wary of television, radio or newspaper advertisements that promote “business opportunities” that appear too good to be true--“*fast cash,*” “*minimal work,*” “*no risk,*” “*be your own boss.*” Many of these promises are false, and victims can lose their life savings.

My office participated in a major state-federal crackdown on unscrupulous marketers of work-at-home scams and “business opportunity” plans. Our investigations resulted in criminal and civil enforcement actions against more than 200 operations that victimized tens of thousands of consumers. Consumers involved in these scams lost more than \$100 million.

Fraud is most often associated with vending machine, display rack, pay phone, medical billing, work-at-home and some internet-related business opportunities. It has also been found with envelope stuffing and surplus goods sales.

The people behind these schemes are not really interested in helping you run a successful business. They want your money. They mislead you about the opportunity’s earnings potential and promote a scheme that has little chance of succeeding--for example, a business with little or no market. They may ruin your chances of success by providing low quality or outdated merchandise and poor quality equipment, such as defective pay phones and vending machines, and locations that get little foot traffic, like out-of-the-way snack shops, stores in deserted strip malls and rural gas stations.

Before investing in a work-at-home business opportunity, you should consider the following tips:

- Obtain all necessary information about the program before signing a contract.
- Obtain pre-investment information in writing, including the number and percentage of previous purchasers who achieved the promised earnings.
- Check to see if a franchise seller is registered, as required by California law, with the California Department of Corporations by calling 1-866-275-2677, or if the seller of other business opportunities is on file with the Attorney General’s Office by calling 1-900-952-5225.
- Make sure that the promoter provides the disclosure documents required by law.

- Interview current investors in person, preferably where the business operates, to reduce your risk of being misled by people hired to give favorable testimonies and to get a better sense of how the business works.
- Obtain professional advice. Spending a few hundred dollars to talk to a lawyer, accountant or other expert is a wise move, especially when a life’s savings is on the line.
- Check out the company with your local consumer protection agency and the Better Business Bureau, but be aware that the absence of complaints doesn’t necessarily mean the company is legitimate. Unscrupulous companies may settle complaints, change their names or move to avoid detection.

If you have spent money and time on a work-at-home program that you now believe to be illegitimate and you can’t resolve the dispute with the company, file a complaint with the Public Inquiry Unit of the Attorney General’s Office by writing to P.O. Box 944255, Sacramento, CA 94244-2550, or by visiting the Attorney General’s website at www.ag.ca.gov/consumers/mailform.htm.

No investment is risk-free. However, a bit of background work can lay the foundation for a solid opportunity or steer you clear of a shaky one.


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
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
